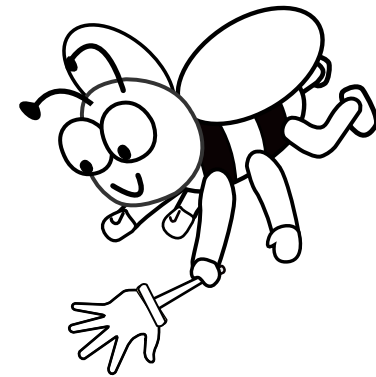


Anybody Can Play PIANO Cut, Match, Paste Activity

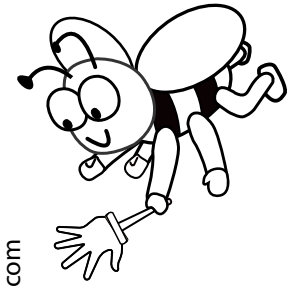


This is another patterning activity to help the children maneuver on the piano keyboard.

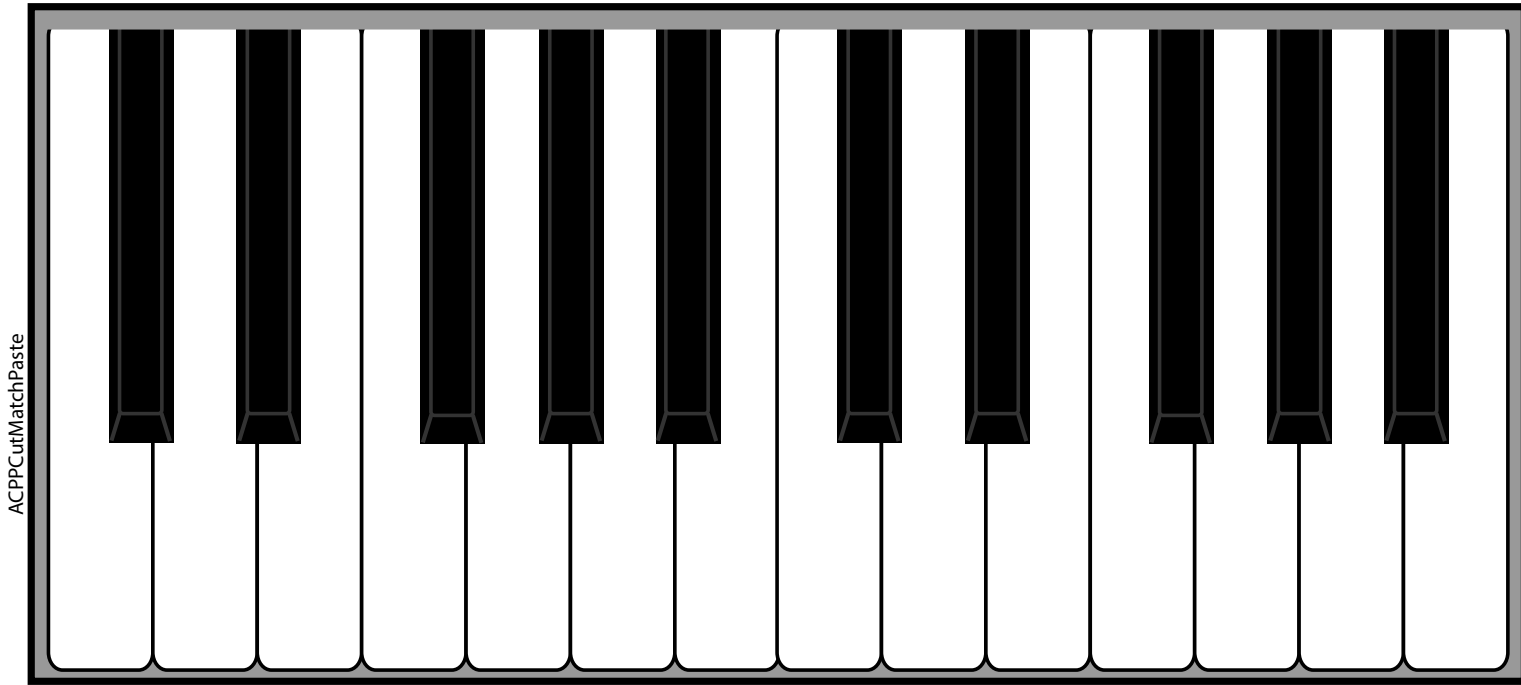
If the children are able to use a scissors and cut reasonably well, they can cut out the four sets of keys on the lower edge of the paper. If the children cannot cut well enough, teachers can pre-cut the shapes and just hand them out.

The object is to paste the sets of keys on top of keys that look exactly the same. First have the children observe that there are only two different shapes. One has three black stripes that are called “black keys” on the piano. The white parts of the shape are called “white keys” on the piano. Note that when there are 3 black keys there are 4 white keys and when there are 2 black keys there are 3 white keys. The white keys look just like they are holding (hugging) the black keys together!

Refer to the shapes as: TWO black keys standing together and THREE black keys standing together. If you cover up the black keys all the white keys look the same, so the black keys help us find our place on the piano keyboard.
